## 4 acts of Love

(Reflections from the sermon on Sunday – May 1, 2016)

(Lesson 4) Act #3: Genuine Humility

"Your love for the world will prove you are my disciples."

John 13:35 NLT

80% of unchurched people (not attended church in one year) feel judged, they don't want to be lectured and their perception of Christians falls in the category of hypocrisy. What do we do?

Researchers tell us that people are longing for what Jesus has to offer. They may be leaving the church (more than 10 churches are closing per day in the US), but they are hungry for God.

- 91% say they believe in God
- 88% say faith is important
- 64% are open to pursuing their faith in an environment other than a church.

(The Pew Research Center – 2012; The Barna Group – 2009)

People say they are exploring and searching for answers. Accordingly we must find a way to reach them.

We have found in our previous two studies that Radical Hospitality takes initiative to show the true heart of Christ to those who feel like they will be, or are being judged – not letting the stain of sin hide the need of one's heart. And Fearless Conversation is a bold move on the part of believers to eliminate the lecture and implement listening.

This study focuses in on the hypocritical image of church goers that people outside the church often see.

Our culture today is crying out for leaders and churches who value face-toface, voice-to-voice, heart-to-heart interaction.

Can we be ourselves and not over do the process? Try these suggestions for being intentional and non-competitive:

- Plan to Learn from Others Think of engaging someone that may be polar-opposite from you
- Embrace All Ages Young and old alike
- Model Vulnerability Don't be afraid to tell your story; layer by layer
- Cut the Committees A ruling committee tends to control, which is the exact opposite of genuine humility – "We're all in this together"
- Conduct a "Rules Audit" Find things in or around the church that may communicate rules and find another way to communicate the message desired.
